UPDATES

McDonald's *E. coli* **outbreak update:** Missouri now has 8 confirmed cases of *E. coli* linked to the McDonald's outbreak. CDC offers an <u>update</u> (10/22/2024) and the following talking points for responding to local inquiries:

Key Points:

- Epidemiologic and traceback information show that fresh, silvered onions are the likely source of illness in this outbreak.
- As of October 30, 2024:
 - 15 new illnesses have been reported, bringing the total to 90.
 - Five more people have been hospitalized, bringing the total to 27.
 - The most recent illness onset date is October 16, 2024.
- All new illnesses occurred before McDonald's and Taylor Farms took action to remove onions from food service locations.
- Due to the product actions taken by McDonald's and Taylor Farms, the CDC believes the continued risk to the public is very low.

What You Should Do:

- If you have severe symptoms of *E. coli* infection, seek health care, and tell your provider about what you ate.
- Businesses should not use recalled onions supplied by Taylor Farms.

E. coli Symptoms:

- Most people infected with Shiga toxin-producing *E. coli* experience severe stomach cramps, diarrhea (often bloody), and vomiting.
 - Symptoms usually start 3 to 4 days after swallowing the bacteria.
 - Most people recover without treatment after 5 to 7 days.
- Some people may develop serious kidney problems (hemolytic uremic syndrome, also called HUS) and would need to be hospitalized.

Vaccine ordering: DHSS Bureau of Immunizations reminds that providers order enough vaccine supply before November 15, 2024, to last through January 1, 2025. Reconciliations must be current or no older than 14 days to submit an order. Additional orders can be placed through December 10, 2024, but orders placed after December 10 may not arrive before the holidays.

Environmental Self-Assessment: DHSS Bureau of Environmental Health Services (BEHS) is reviewing the state of Environmental Health Operations in Missouri using a tool called the Environmental Health-Local Evaluation and Assessment Program (EH-LEAP). As a first step, they ask that by November 27th, LPHAs complete the Local Environmental Health Self-Assessment and Data Questionnaire designed to gather your opinions on environmental health operations. State Email/Internet Update: LPHAs who utilize state of Missouri email addresses (lpha.mo.gov) and the phone option (SMS text or phone call) for multi-factor authentication (MFA) will need to switch to an alternative form of verification before December 31. Hard tokens will no longer be allowed for verification, but the Okta Verify or Google Authenticator apps are free options for verification. Also, there has been a legal exclusion added to State policy that restricts your personal device from being confiscated due to a Sunshine Request if the device's ONLY work-related function is MFA.
